Curators research, study, and interpret art, caring holistically for a particular area of a museum's collection. In larger institutions, curators' areas of responsibility are highly specialized. Curators acquire works for the collection and they conceptualize and develop exhibitions/galleries. They write and speak extensively for various audiences and collaborate with living artists and communities.

Curators in art museums typically have education in art history, art, history or museum studies. An advanced degree (MA, Ph.D., etc.) in art history, art, or a related area is required for most curatorial roles in museums.



Educators connect people to art. They plan and teach programs and events that happen in the galleries for participants of all ages. These programs are opportunities for people to have experiences with works of art and the ideas those works suggest – experiences that might be transformative, even in tiny ways. Educators work responsively, listening to the interests and needs of museum audiences and individual artists that they collaborate with.

Educators have educational backgrounds in a range of fields, most frequently art or art history. Many of them have graduate degrees in art history, studio art, museum studies, public humanities, education, or other related fields.






























Skills:

Conservators care for works of art in a physical sense. They document, examine, and treat objects. Their work is reversible and guided by a scientific understanding of materials. They work with curators, registrars, installers, and other staff – as well as living artists – to make decisions that strike a balance between preservation and access.

Conservators in art museums often have a background or interest in art-making that informs the manual dexterity needed in their work, as well as coursework in chemistry. A graduate program in conservation is required, and many graduate programs require hands-on experience prior to starting.


Registrars and collections managers oversee the physical maintenance of objects and maintain records related to the collection. Those records are both physical and digital and, in addition to basic data about each work, include legal documents like loan agreements and deeds of gift. They are responsible for storage, track the creation and use of photography (of objects, spaces, and people), and lead disaster planning.

Registrars in art museums often have undergraduate degrees in art history, art, history, archaeology, or a related field, and advanced degrees in library science or museum studies.



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












Skills:

Digital Content Producers & Graphic Designers create media content for galleries and online, work with artists on digital projects, create environmental graphics, and design print publications and marketing content. They are often responsible for a museum's web presence. Their work straddles many other departments, and may be positioned within education (because of the interpretive nature of digital content), exhibition design, or marketing and communications.

Digital initiatives specialists and graphic designers in art museums have backgrounds in design and are interested in how design and digital media supports a museum's mission.



















Skills:




